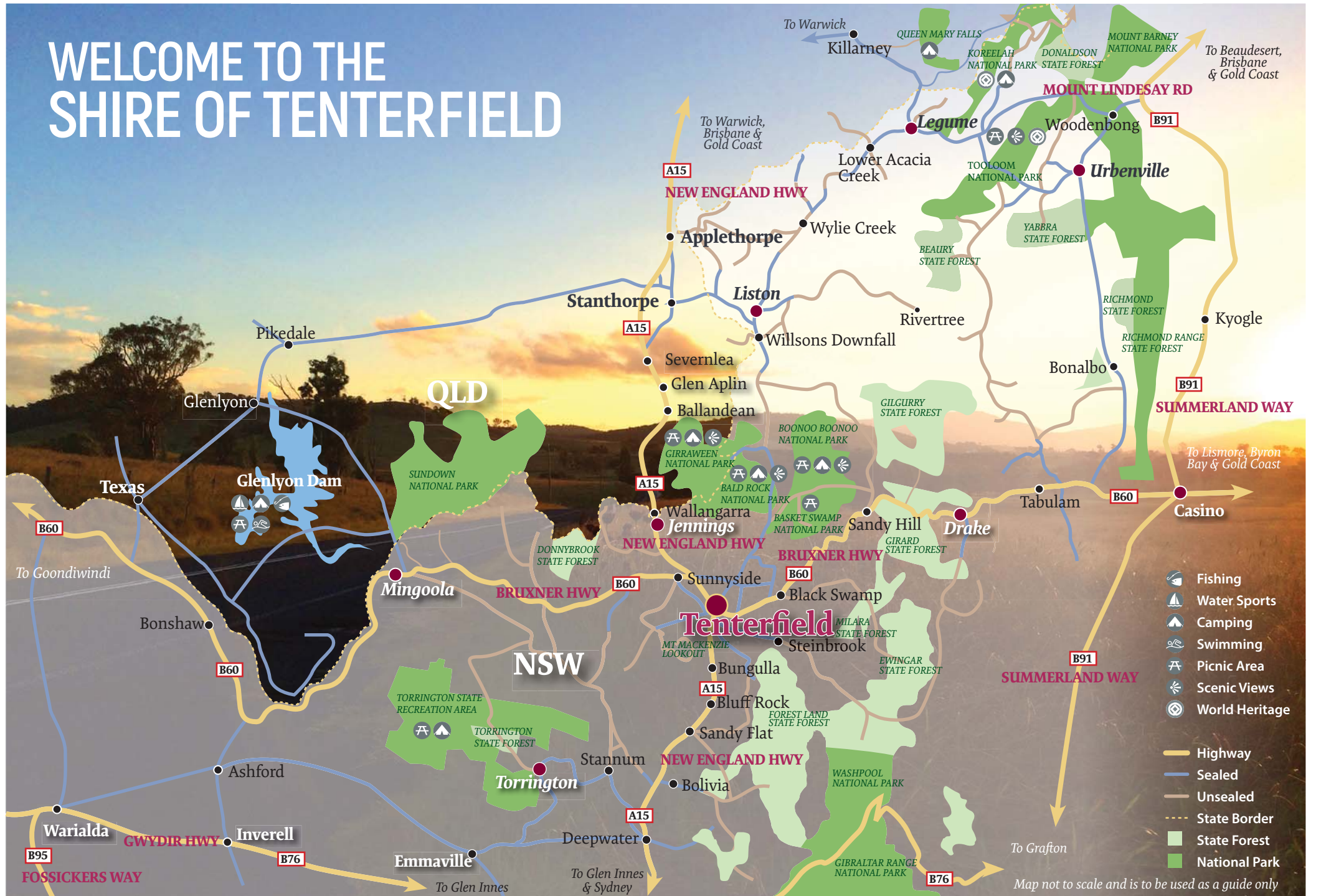

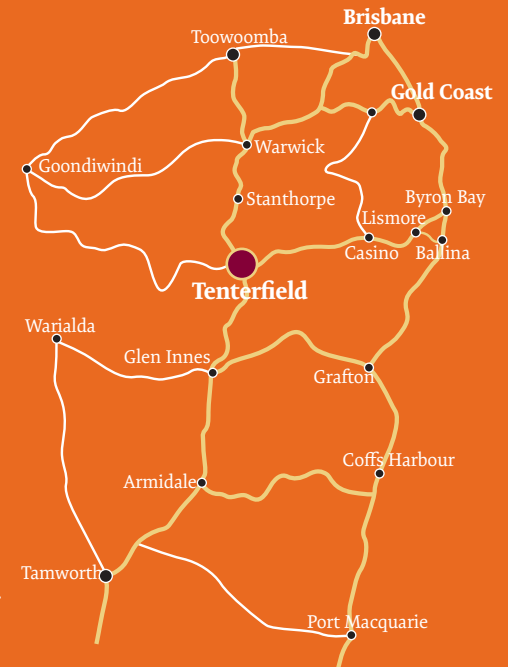

Tenterfield is an easy 3.5 hour drive from Brisbane and the Gold Coast, and has good road access via the New England Highway and the Bruxner Highway.

There are also plenty of opportunities to get off the beaten track and enjoy the scenic route.


There are 5 major airports within a 3.5 hour radius of Tenterfield, all of which offer car hire options. A number of companies provide coach services to Tenterfield from Brisbane, Sydney, Armidale, Tamworth, Casino and Lismore.

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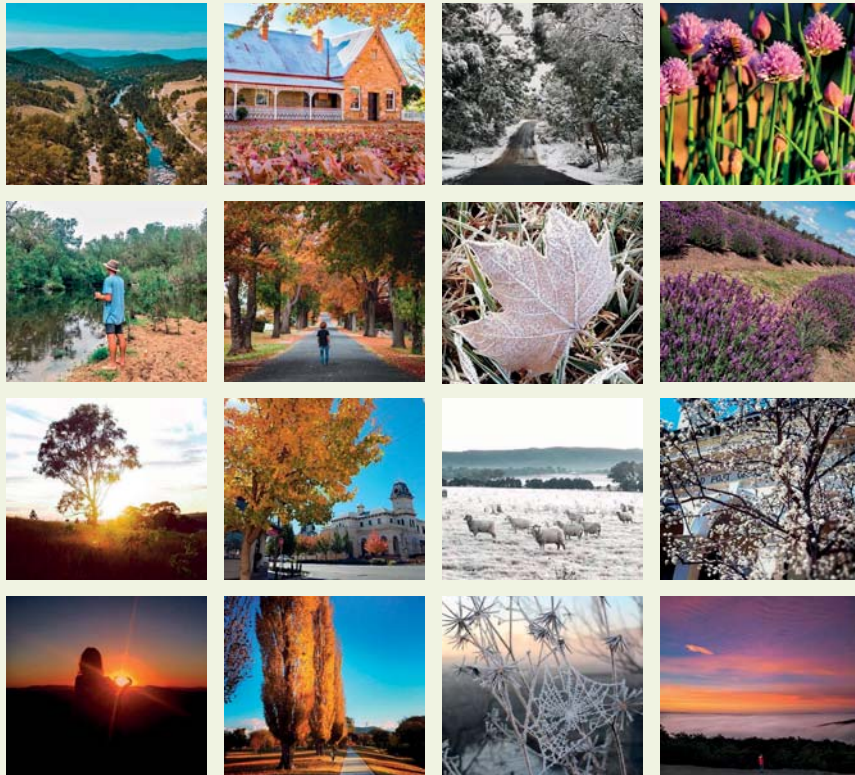
For many thousands of years Bald Rock served as neutral ground for the three Aboriginal nations of the region: the Jukemba, Bundjalung and Kamilaroi. Bald Rock was considered a boundary by the nations, so meetings and trade could occur on the site without each nation having to journey through the other territories.

Council acknowledges the traditional custodians of this land. In doing so, we pay our respects to the Elders past, present and emerging, of the Jukemba, Kamilaroi and Bundjalung nations and extend that respect to other Aboriginal people.

TENTERFIELD TOP TEN

1. Climb Bald Rock (the largest exposed granite monolith in the southern hemisphere) and be rewarded with awe-inspiring 360° views over the surrounding bushland.
2. Visit the Tenterfield Saddler on High Street - immortalised in 1972 by Tenterfield-born Aussie entertainment legend, Peter Allen (the grandson of saddler, George Woolnough - the saddler here for 52 years until 1960) through his well-known song 'Tenterfield Saddler'. Operated as a saddlery for over 100 years, this place is no stranger to famous faces, with iconic Australian bush poet and author, Banjo Patterson, being a regular visitor during his time in Tenterfield in the early 1900s. Oh, if walls could talk!
3. Uncover Tenterfield's rich history and heritage, as you step back in time to explore the lovingly preserved Railway Station, Sir Henry Parkes School of Arts and Centenary Cottage museums. Tip: Download the Soundtrails app to your smart phone or tablet and listen to stories of a bygone era while exploring the history of this federation town (allow approx. 1 hour).
4. Take a scenic country drive and marvel at Granite Country formations and rocky outcrops. A popular route is along Kildare and Mt Mackenzie Roads, where you can marvel at Doctors Nose, Little Bald Rock and Draining Rock. Mt Mackenzie Lookout also offers a great picnic spot and BBQ area.
5. Get back to basics and connect with nature. Go camping, hiking, swimming or fishing while you discover national parks, World Heritage rainforests, woodlands, gorges, granite formations, fern gullies and more.
6. Explore the region's villages and mix with the locals - check out our online events calendar to see what's on.
7. Discover boutique shopping gems when you explore Tenterfield's popular Rouse Street retail strip and surrounds.
8. Be spoilt for choice with a myriad of cafés, restaurants, and hearty country pubs welcoming you to taste your way around the region, as you discover local food, wine, beer and other delicacies.
9. Tee off at one of the finest country golf courses in Australia boasting picturesque greens and magnificent views.
10. Experience the 4 seasons - from snow-dotted mountains in winter and the awakening of nature in spring, to perfect summer days and the blazing colours of autumn.

TRUE ADVENTURE

Sitting high in the pristine New England Tablelands, Tenterfield provides a natural playground for visitors, young and old.

The rugged mountainous terrain presents some of the most spectacular scenic views in all of northern New South Wales, inviting you to marvel at curious granite outcrops and rock formations including the largest granite monolith in the southern hemisphere, Bald Rock.

Explore seemingly never-ending forests and woodlands as you discover the region's six national parks - Bald Rock, Boonoo Boonoo, Koreelah, Tooloom, Torrington and Basket Swamp - all offering their own distinctive experiences and sights to behold.

Neighbouring national parks, Girraween and Sundown, are just over the border in Queensland, creating a continuous path of green space to explore. There is no shortage of trails, creeks, rivers, waterholes and rockpools to discover or birds and wildlife to meet.

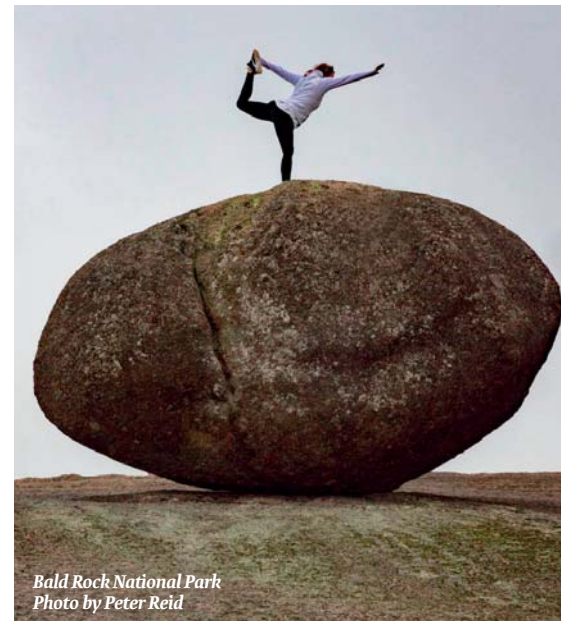
BALD ROCK NATIONAL PARK



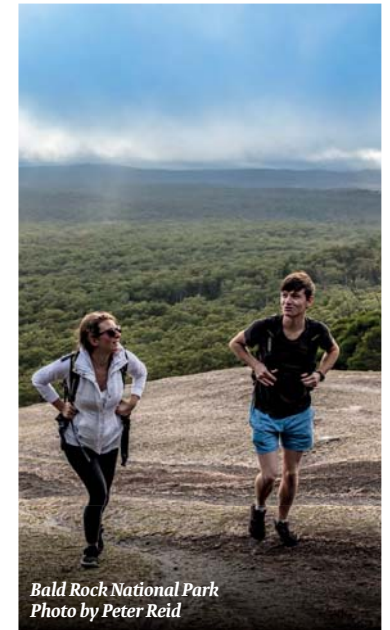
With unparalleled views, undulating and ever-changing terrains, grounding nature walks, and rock formations that will transport you back to the Triassic Period, Bald Rock National Park is a natural wonder like no other.

Located 29km from Tenterfield on the New South Wales and Queensland border, Bald Rock National Park is home to an abundance of wildlife (including the rare spotted tailed quoll), native plants and wildflowers. Its most famous resident, however, is the mighty Bald Rock, which rises above the horizon at almost 1300 metres above sea level.

As the largest granite monolith in the Southern Hemisphere, Bald Rock dominates the National Park's skyline, enticing visitors to climb to the summit and see the world from its perspective.

Bald Rock towers 260m above the surrounding bushland, providing a 750m long by 500m wide space to explore. Here, climbers will feel like they're on top of the world!

Take the gentle 2.5km climb to the summit, winding through granite arches and fern gullies, or challenge yourself with a short, but steep climb up the face of the rock. At the top, you will be greeted by a collection of granite archways, scattered boulders, ravines, and a group of enormous smooth granite stones, known as the Granite Titans, which balance across one another in the most magical way.

BOONOO BOONOO NATIONAL PARK



Pronounced 'bunna bunoo', this woodland park has spectacular river and gorge scenery. Swim and camp beside the river and explore secluded rockpools. Head to the lookout and watch as the Boonoo Boonoo River cascades over the granite cliff edge, plunging 210m into the gorge below. As you explore the park, be sure to visit Morgan's Gully - a fascinating area that marks the site of an old goldfield from the 1890s.

BASKET SWAMP NATIONAL PARK



Explore Basket Swamp Falls, pack a picnic and head to Timbarra Lookout or visit Woolloomooloolni Aboriginal Place. This waterlogged park of 200ha of heath and sedges cleans, stores and slowly releases water into local creeks and the Clarence River. Although there are minimal picnic facilities in the National Park, the adjoining Boonoo State Forest offers picnic and bush camping facilities

GIRRAWEE NATIONAL PARK



Located across the border in Queensland, Girrawee is a park of massive granite outcrops, creeks, waterways and precariously balanced boulders. Spectacular wildflower displays splash colour amongst the granite in spring.

(Road is sealed)

TOOLOOM NATIONAL PARK



The extensive subtropical rainforest and red gum of World Heritage Toooloom provides habitat for the most diverse kangaroo and wallaby population in Australia. The National Park offers a picnic area, a lookout, and two short walking tracks that provide an opportunity to experience the amazing natural environment of lush rainforest, Toooloom Scrub and Strangler Figs.

TORRINGTON STATE RECREATION AREA



Dry forests, woodlands, scenic rocky outcrops, balancing boulders, gorges, swamps, creeks and wildflowers provide the perfect spot for bushwalking, birdwatching, fossicking and 4WDing. On granite terrain, Torrington has over 400 different plants, 37 of which are rare/threatened. See dramatic 360° views of the surrounding tablelands at Thunderbolt's Lookout, let your imagination run away on the Mystery Face walk, or try your luck fossicking in the creek near Blatherarm campground.

KOREELAH NATIONAL PARK



Pockets of World Heritage listed rainforest hug the steep slopes below the Acacia Plateau. Enjoy easy walking, remote camping and fantastic birdwatching. You might be lucky enough to see the endangered double-eyed fig parrot, eastern bristle bird or black-striped wallaby. Take a stroll along the rocky gorge and spend the afternoon swimming in natural pools and spotting wildlife.

MOTORCYCLING

Tenterfield is a bike-friendly region, offering off-the-beaten-track scenic rides and adventures for all levels of experience. The Bruxner Highway, one of Australia's great motorcycling roads, travels through winding picturesque valleys on its way up into the high country. This low-traffic route combines tight bends and flat open sections of smooth and well-formed road, as well as endless off-road opportunities to explore. With plenty of accommodation options throughout the region (many offering undercover parking and group rates), Tenterfield is the ideal destination for your next motorcycling adventure.

NATIONAL TRAIL

Australia's Bicentennial National Trail is a 5,330km self-reliant trekking route through Australian bush, wilderness and mountain areas, and is suitable for horse-riding, walking and mountain biking. The National Trail traverses rugged remote country east of the Great Dividing Range and Tenterfield, following the Demon Fault line.

MOUNT MACKENZIE SCENIC DRIVE

When visiting Tenterfield, this short drive is a must do. Passing unique granite formations, sheep, cattle and kangaroos, you'll wind your way past spectacular scenery and up to the Mount Mackenzie Scenic Lookout. At 1298m above sea level, it's the perfect place for a picnic, barbeque or to watch the sun go down. The lookout offers great views over the Tenterfield township, surrounding mountains and countryside. It's always a few degrees cooler in summer, and the first place to see snow in winter.

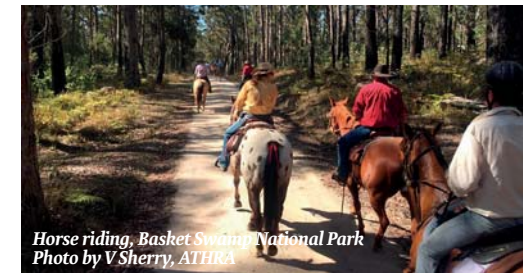

HORSE RIDING

Horse lovers will delight in an abundance of riding trails through national parks, state forests and on private properties. Basket Swamp National Park and Washpool National Park (near Glen Innes) offer trails accessible for horse riding, as well as facilities like trailer parking areas, hitching posts, picnic areas and accommodation (Four Bull Hut). The Border Country Trail Riders group (ATHRA) hosts monthly trail rides and welcomes newcomers.

CYCLING

Explore National Parks, fire trails, mountain bike trails and scenic drive routes across the region all from the seat of your bicycle. With various cycling locations catering for different fitness and experience levels from beginners through to advanced riders, there are many opportunities to explore world-class scenery along the way.

4WDING

The region has hundreds of 4WD tracks that cater for all levels of enthusiasts. Trails take visitors through creeks, gorges and valleys, past rivers and rocky outcrops, and over mountains. Soft off-road adventures take visitors to the Timbarra River, Mole River, Boorook, Boonoo Boonoo, Torrington, Urbenville, Liston and Legume. For the more adventurous, there are a number of trails around Torrington, Basket Swamp and Girard Forest (take note of signs). 4WD parks in the region offer visitors medium to challenging tracks.

FISHING

Tenterfield Creek holds Yellow Belly and Cod and is accessible for fishing via a number of access points to the west of town, including Deadman's Reserve (14km west). The Mole and Dumaresq Rivers hold Yellow Belly, Cod and Catfish. Glenlyon Dam (QLD) has Murray Cod, Yellow Belly, Silver Perch, Spangled Perch and Eel-tailed Catfish. To the east, the Clarence River holds Bass, Catfish and Mullet, as well as Eastern Cod (must be returned). Many private operators in the Tenterfield region offer access to creeks and rivers for prime fishing opportunities, including local fishing charter companies.

Note: A fishing license is required for NSW (available online from Service NSW or in person at Jeff Hollands Sport Store) and Glenlyon Dam (available at the camping grounds). Closed season for Murray Cod is 1 September to 30 November.

HISTORY & HERITAGE

SETTLEMENT

The first legal title was granted to R.R. Mackenzie for Tenterfield Station in 1842 and the Tenterfield Post office opened in 1849. The township was gazetted in 1851, making it one of the oldest towns in the New England, with allotments being sold in 1854. In 1858, gold was discovered at Fairfield (now Drake) and shortly afterwards at Timbarra and Boonoo Boonoo. In 1870 the population was less than 900, but the town had five hotels, a School of Arts and three churches. The railway opened to Tenterfield in 1886 and in 1888 to Wallangarra, linking Sydney and Brisbane by rail for the first time.

THE STORY BEHIND THE NAME

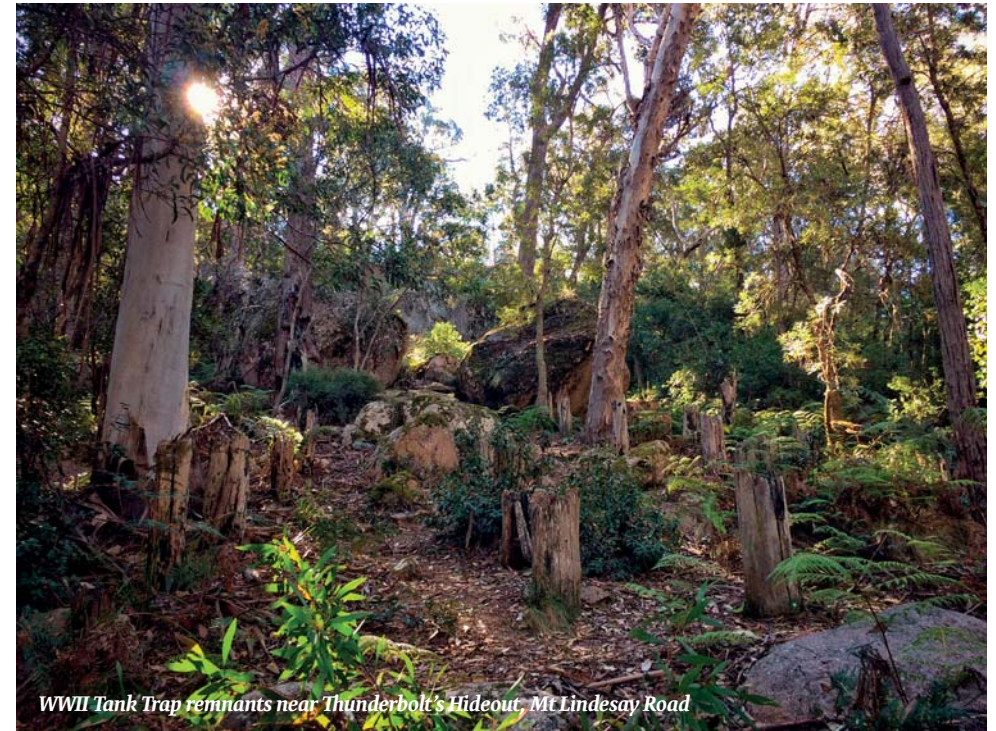
Gazetted as a town in 1851, Tenterfield is one of the New England's oldest towns and one of three Australian federation towns. While there has been wide debate about the naming of Tenterfield, accepted evidence is in favour of one of the area's first settlers, S. A. Donaldson, naming the locality after the home of his maiden aunts in Haddington, Scotland. Originating in the Mill district where 'tenters' (hooks) were set in the field and used to dry the wool which was later used to weave cloth.

TENTERFIELD - A FEDERATION TOWN

Known as the 'Birthplace of our Nation' - Sir Henry Parkes delivered his famous federation speech in the Tenterfield School of Arts on 24 October 1889, which ultimately led to the Federation of all Australian States in 1901. The School of Arts now houses a fantastic museum dedicated to the life of Sir Henry Parkes, Australian federation and local history. Follow the Tenterfield Heritage Trail and visit significant historical landmarks. Be amazed by the transport, defence and political history of Tenterfield and the role it played in shaping our nation.

WORLD WAR II

During World War II, up to 11,000 troops were trained in jungle warfare at local camps, including the London Bridge Army Camp, before being sent to New Guinea and the Pacific. Tenterfield also formed a strategic line of defence, with the installation of tank traps (timber posts and concrete triangles) along the Mt Lindesay Road and Paddy's Flat Road. These were to be the second line of defence if an invasion occurred in the northern part of Australia.

INDIGENOUS ANCESTRY

The region was home to three main Aboriginal nations for many thousands of years before European settlement; the Jukemba, Bundjalung, and Kamilaroi people. The Bundjalung and Jukemba (Yukambul) people were the first to inhabit the land now known as Tenterfield Shire. The Jukemba reputedly called the area 'Moombilleen', meaning 'place of wild honey'. One of the region's most famous landmarks, Bald Rock, served as neutral ground for the three nations. It was considered a boundary so meetings and trade could occur on the site without each nation having to journey through the other territories. The Githabul people have lived in the northern part of the Shire, in and around the lush forests of the ranges straddling the New South Wales/Queensland border, for tens of thousands of years.

MUSEUMS & HERITAGE WALKS

Take a leisurely stroll through historic Tenterfield and explore the history of the town and the role it played in shaping our nation. Discover the stories behind Australia's federation at the Sir Henry Parkes School of Arts Museum. Be transported to yesteryear as you browse a well-preserved collection of railway memorabilia at the Tenterfield Railway Museum. And admire a fine example of colonial architecture and historical collections when visiting Centenary Cottage Museum.

Tip: Check out our Tenterfield Heritage Trail to learn about the history of over 35 significant sites and buildings, stop and read the interpretive signage throughout the heart of town, and download the Soundtrails app to listen to stories of a bygone era.

FAMOUS FACES

Tenterfield has been home to a variety of legends over the years. Born in Tenterfield, Peter Allen, one of Australia's most acclaimed entertainers, will be forever connected through the Tenterfield Saddler. Solicitor, J.F. Thomas, who owned the local paper, defended Harry "Breaker" Morant in the Boer War in 1902. Well-known Australian bush poet, journalist, and author, Banjo Paterson, came to Tenterfield and married his sweetheart, Miss Alice Walker, of Tenterfield Station. Dr Teddy Hon, born in Tenterfield, developed the Hon Heart Machine to monitor the heartbeat of unborn children, reducing infant mortality rates around the world. Then there were the rebels who became part of Australian folklore, such as Captain Thunderbolt & the Wilson Gang.

TENTERFIELD SADDLER

A stop in Tenterfield is not complete without a visit to the Tenterfield Saddler - immortalised in song by Tenterfield-born Aussie entertainment legend, Peter Allen, and where the old ceilings wear 130 years of tobacco stains, wooden floors are patched with scraps of leather, and visitors can see the working conditions of 100 years ago first-hand.

If walls could talk, this building would have a story or two to tell! For 50 years this quaint blue-granite Saddlery was a key meeting place in town, where Saddler, George Woolnough, plied his trade; listening but undisturbed by the chatter and opinions of those who wandered in. The saddlery was no stranger to famous faces, with iconic Australian bush poet and author, Banjo Patterson, being a regular visitor during his time in Tenterfield in the early 1900s.

DISCOVERING TENTERFIELD SHIRE

The villages of the Tenterfield Shire are full of history and character, and offer plenty to see and do – from museums, lavender farms and art galleries to 4WD trails, waterfalls and country pubs. With plenty of accommodation options, visitors can choose from self-contained cottages, wilderness retreats, farm stays, camping, 4WD parks, hotels, and motels.

During the late 1880s, areas such as **Boonoo Boonoo**, **Willsons Downfall** and **Sandy Hill** boomed as part of the mining industry. Gold was discovered in **Drake** in 1858, tin in **Torrington** in 1881 and **Liston** was the centre of a busy silver and tin mining industry. Towns grew to include hotels, stores, butchers, bakers, cafés, post offices, boarding houses, churches, blacksmiths and police stations. **Torrington** still has large deposits of topaz and semi-precious gemstones and mining has given way to fossicking in the area. The waterways near **Drake** also provide popular spots to try your hand at panning for gold.

Jennings (NSW) and **Wallangarra** (QLD) are divided by the state border and the railway break of gauge has welcomed many an

interesting character in its time. Sir Henry Parkes and the Prince of Wales both had to disembark and change trains here back in the day. The railway station has been beautifully restored, features a heritage museum, and offers visitors the chance to stand in two states.

In the 1870s, tobacco production was a key industry in and around **Mingoola** and there are still a number of relics, including drying houses and tobacco barns built by Chinese and Italian immigrants. Tobacco has given way to wine

and, these days, local vineyards, such as Reedy Creek Estate and Zappa Wines, produce an exquisite selection of Italian varietals.

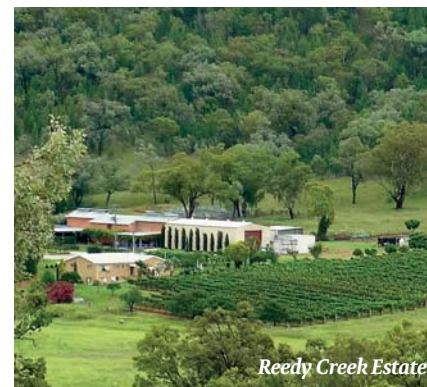
Although village life may have quietened down, there is still plenty to do and many places to relax, unwind and enjoy nature. Camping, swimming, fishing, canoeing, bushwalking, 4WDing – it's all possible in the villages of Tenterfield.

In **Liston**, Undercliffe Falls descends 150m over a 30m wide rock face into a deep pool, which is ideal for swimming. South-west of **Urbenville**, Tooloom Falls is a great spot for swimming and picnics. Between **Urbenville** and **Drake**, fish, swim and explore the WWII Tank Traps at **Paddy's Flat**. From Tenterfield to Drake, the Rocky River Scenic Drive (4WD recommended) meanders through granite terrain and farmlands and offers stunning mountain scenery.

The **Rocky River** area offers just that, as it beckons visitors to explore the Timbarra River, which offers a great picnic and camping spot 35km south of **Drake**. **Mingoola** provides access to Glenlyon Dam – a great spot for water sports and fishing (the tourist park has full facilities); and Sundown National Park – a rugged wilderness area

of spectacular sharp ridges and steep-sided gorges.

For history buffs, the Pioneer Cottage and Historical Museum in **Urbenville** presents displays relating to the town and district, as well as the timber industry. Built in 1892, the cottage was relocated to **Urbenville** in 1977. The museum is generally open on weekends but hours are subject to change so, to avoid disappointment, phone (02) 6634 1254 in advance to check.

After a day of sightseeing, kick back, relax and enjoy a cold drink, hearty meal and warm country hospitality in a country pub. The **Jennings** Hotel is the only pub on the Queensland/New South Wales border and the Crown Hotel in **Urbenville** and Lunatic Hotel in **Drake** are favourite stopovers for many.

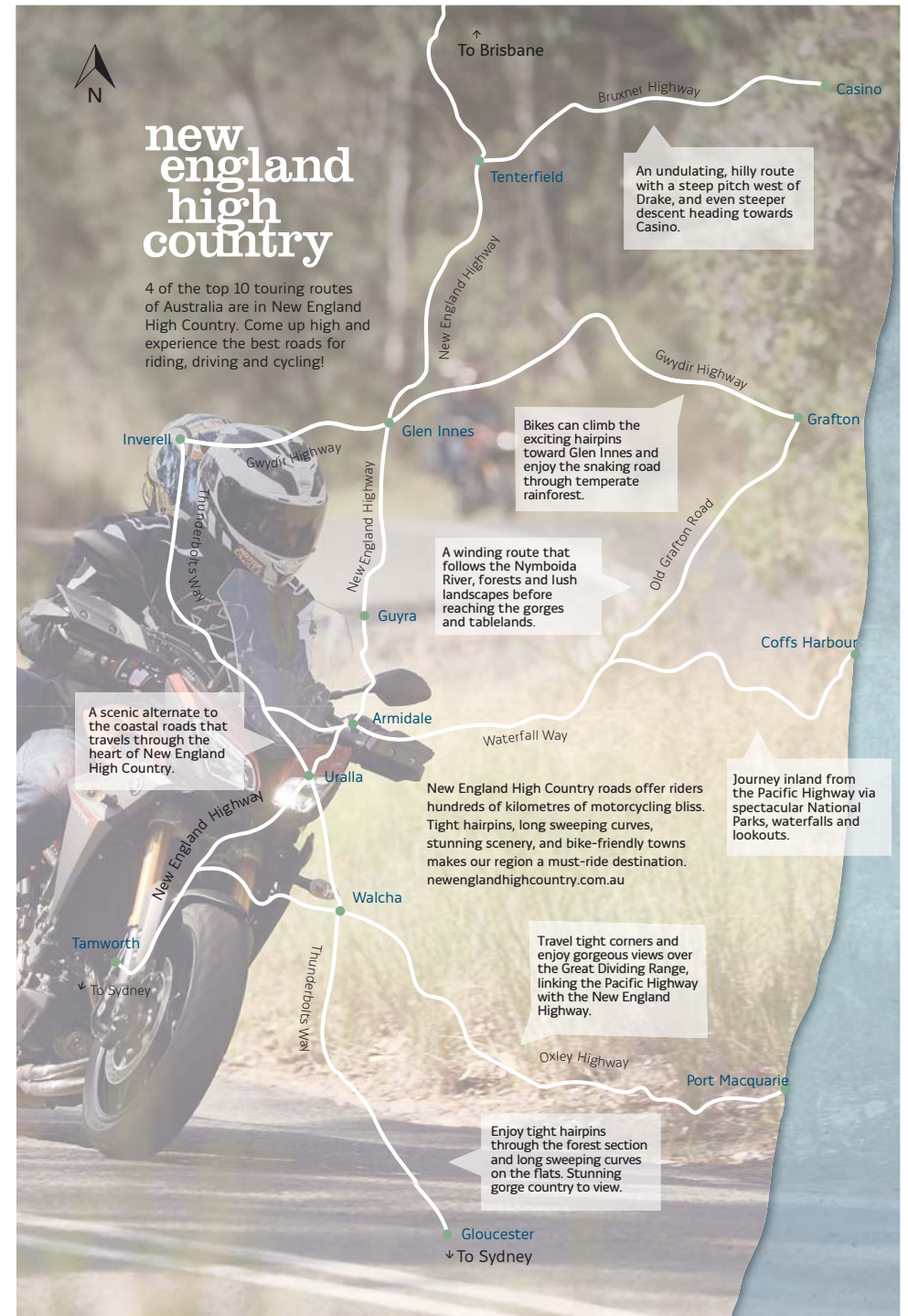

A display of memorabilia from Parkes' personal life, including a compelling portrait by Julian Ashton, ivory carvings and journals is situated in the gallery.

The School of Arts is owned by the National Trust of Australia, and in 1957 was the first building in NSW to be gifted to the Trust by an act of parliament. The National Trust of Australia is committed to promoting and conserving Australia's indigenous, natural and historic heritage through advocacy, conservation and educational programmes. Members of the National Trust of Australia receive free entry into the museum.

The complex also features the Tenterfield Cinema & Theatre. This charming cinema features state of the art digital projection and screenings of all the latest movies, as well as live performances of music and theatre. Check the website or Facebook for what's on.

The Library offers free access to the Internet, and is named in honour of the Tenterfield Saddler, George Woolnough, grandfather of Peter Allen.
